## Hi Lions,

Our Grand Island Lions Club will be assisted by District 20N Lions in the performance of vision screenings in our public schools January 9th and 11th. Over 600 pre-K to second grade children will be screened who attend Sidway, Huth, and Kaegebein schools. Island Kids, Kiddos Korner, and St. Timothy's childcare centers have signed up to allow us to perform screenings the following week. We are currently awaiting permission to present the Lions SEE (Screening Eyes Early) program in order to perform screenings in the other childcare centers on the island along with St. Stephen's School. There is also an unknown population of island children who do not attend any school or childcare program. Arrangements are being made to reserve the conference room at our public library to accommodate screenings for this group of children on select days and times of the week of January 22nd to the 26th. Notices will appear in the Buffalo News, Niagara Frontier Publications, and <u>isledegrande.com</u>.

The Lions SEE program uses volunteers to operate state-of-the-art "cameras" to take digital images of children's eyes. More commonly referred to as a "screener", an onboard computer analyzes the images for potential amblyopic ("lazy-eye") conditions that, if left untreated in some cases, may cause irreversible vision blindness in one eye by the time the child reaches seven years of age. Milder forms of amblyopia, such as near- and far-sightedness, can be treated with corrective eyeglasses. Advantages of using these screeners are that there is no contact with the child and that a dimly lit room serves to dilate the children's eyes without use of drops. Further, screening can be readily performed within the children's classroom with minimal disruption of the curriculum. The data is downloaded to the school nurse's or the center's owner's computer with a printout available to be given to the children's parents and/or guardians for follow-up. The screening, with an 80-95% accuracy rate, serves as an adjunct to other vision measurement methods ut does not replace a comprehensive eye exam by a qualified pediatric ophthalmologist or optometrist.

Volunteers are always needed to assist during screenings and/or to become a volunteer screener. The learning curve is quite short which at times amazes those who thought they were technology-challenged. If you would like to become involved in the program, or simply want to observe, please let me know. You will be left with the incredible sensation that you are involved with the protection of the vision of our most vulnerable citizens.
